Application process	Students should apply online through Kent Vision.
	The link to the application form will be emailed direct to the nominated students with the Guide for Erasmus students. Students must read this carefully <i>before</i> applying.
	All students must upload their Learning Agreement and recent transcript of marks as part of their application.
English language	Undergraduates – minimum B1 on CEFR scale (A higher level is beneficial.)
requirements	Postgraduates and staff – minimum B2
	In most cases, a certificate or letter from the home university which confirms the student's English language level is sufficient. If further evidence is required by the School at Kent, the student will be notified.
Postgraduates	Where an exchange agreement allows students to register for Masters degree, those students will be required to submit a Secure English Language Test certificate (SELT).
Visa requirements	Students who need a Tier 4 visa to study in the UK must have a valid SELT and meet the English Language requirements set by UK Visas and Immigration.

Course Information	
Credits	Undergraduate modules are usually worth either 7.5 ECTS (equivalent to 15 Kent credits) or 15 ECTS (equivalent to 30 Kent credits).
	Postgraduate modules are usually worth 10 ECTS (equivalent to 20 Kent credits) each.
Credit requirements	Erasmus students are expected to take 30 ECTS per teaching term, 60 ECTS for the full academic year. This is the normal student workload and is achievable for Erasmus students.
	Important note: If you expect your students to take fewer credits at Kent, please notify us in writing.
	Module registration is time-consuming and places are limited, so it causes problems when a student drops out of a module or fails to complete the assessment because it is not required by the home university.
Choosing modules	www.kent.ac.uk/courses/modules
	Students should choose modules from the subject area of the exchange.
	More advice about module choices will be sent to nominated students in the Guide for Erasmus Students.
Module registration	Kent degree students choose their modules for the following year in March. It is <u>essential</u> that incoming Erasmus students apply and upload their Learning Agreements as early as possible in order to have the best choice of modules.
	The Erasmus Team will check Learning Agreements and register modules in the months before arrival. Students will be contacted by email about any queries or problems.
	Learning Agreements will be signed when modules have been approved and registered.
Module changes	Kent does <u>not</u> have an "add and drop" period.
	Students may only change registered modules on arrival if there is a timetable clash.
Assessment	Modules may be assessed in various ways: in class test or presentation, coursework essay, end of year exams etc.
	Coursework essays will be set during the term but may have a deadline after the end of term, for example exchange students who leave in December may have a deadline in January. Coursework is submitted online so students can do this after they have left Kent.
Examinations	All examinations are held in the Summer Term (May-June), at the end of the academic year. Resit examinations take place in August.
Undergraduates	Students who are nominated for a period including the Summer Term are required to sit the examinations. Alternative assessment is not offered for students who are registered for the Summer Term.
	Alternative assessment is offered in some Schools but <u>only</u> for students who have been nominated for a study period ending in December or April.
	The School of Economics and Kent Law School do <u>not</u> offer alternative assessment. Students taking Economics or Law should either choose modules

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Postgraduates	which are assessed by coursework only or include the Summer Term in their study period.Assessment is normally by coursework.However, students in the School of Economics should stay for the Summer Term because many postgraduate modules have exams.
Transcripts of Marks	Transcripts of marks are published in July after the Boards of Examiners have met. Originals are sent to students' home addresses. ECTS transcripts are emailed to the partner universities.
	Students finishing in December may request a provisional transcript in February. The final transcript will be published in July.
	Students finishing in April may view their marks in the online Student Data Systems but will receive the official transcript in July.
